**SUBJECT:** Residential Burglary and Arrest

On July 2, 2016, at approximately 11:36 a.m. San Bruno Police Officers responded to the 2900 block of Fleetwood Drive regarding the report of a possible residential burglary in progress.

Upon their arrival, officers found a male subject exiting the residence, carrying property he had taken from inside the home. The subject failed to comply with officers' instructions and resisted officers' efforts to detain him. The subject, identified as twenty-seven year old San Francisco resident Kenyon McDowell, was ultimately taken into custody by officers at the scene.

A subsequent investigation revealed that McDowell had, in fact, burglarized the residence. He was booked into the San Mateo County Jail for charges related to residential burglary, felony assault, possession of stolen property, possession of burglary tools, and resisting arrest. McDowell was found to be on state parole for residential burglary and federal probation. He was also booked for violating the terms of both his parole and probation.

The San Bruno Police Department will continue to deploy uniformed and plainclothes officers to conduct enforcement and surveillance operations in an effort to combat these types of crimes.


Most residential burglars select a residence where they believe no one is home. In order to ensure this, they often knock on a door. If they get an answer they will come up with an excuse for knocking. If they get no answer they commit the burglary. Alert neighbors

provide the biggest help to police in solving these crimes. We encourage the community to remain vigilant and immediately report any suspicious vehicles or activity via 911.

If you return home to find suspicious persons at or near your residence, call 911. Don't confront the suspects. If you find an open/broken window or door, do not enter. The perpetrators may still be inside. Use a cellular phone or a neighbors phone to call 911 and write down license plate numbers of suspicious vehicles. Note descriptions of suspicious persons.
